Making Introductions Properly

Setting Your Cat & Dog Up for Success

Proper introductions are key to forming good relationships between your pets, preventing fights, and decreasing stress

When you bring a rescue home from the BVSPCA, keep in mind that we don't always know their backgrounds or histories

How to Make Proper Introductions:

- Separate your new pet in their own room for the first week. Try feeding each pet on either side of the door, and scent swapping with blankets.
- Let the new pet explore the rest of the house while the other pet is in a separate room or on a walk.
- Set up a vertical "safe space" for the cat and putting the litter box in a dogrestricted area.
- Introduce the dog on a leash to start.
 Allow the dog to see the cat, and reward with a "yes" and a treat each time the dog looks at the cat without reacting (barking, lunging, etc.).
- Keep sessions short, and progress to off leash only once the dog and cat are curious but not fixated on one another, and the dog is calm.

A Few Other Tips:

- The cat may hide. Give him/her time to gain confidence and decide when to face the dog. Do not force an introduction between the pets.
- Do not leave pets together unsupervised until they have fully accepted each other and you are certain they are safe. This may take weeks or months. It will take TIME.
- Some pets become companions, while others simply tolerate each other. The ability of pets to get along depends on their individual personalities.
